IDA McMORRAN

On April 2, 1988, the long and active life of Ida May (Richards) McMorran came to an end. She had lived in Cordova Bay for more than sixty-six years.

Ida Richards, a young school teacher from Bristol, England, arrived in Victoria in 1912. In those days Cordova Bay was a favourite destination of campers and picnickers from Victoria, who arrived by horse and buggy, automobile and train. One of these visitors was Ida: she camped in a tent on the Norris property, at the foot of what is now Claremont Avenue.

In her spare time, Ida worked at the counter of the Canuck Tea Rooms. The Tea Rooms were opened in 1919 by George McMorran Jr. George had moved to Cordova Bay after the death of his father, who had owned several waterfront lots in Cordova Bay, including what is now Agate Lane Park. George Jr., in his turn, purchased the land where the new condominiums are being built, and where the shopping plaza stands.

Before long, a romance developed between Ida and George. On quiet evenings they could often be seen gliding across the bay in George's canoe. They married in 1922.

In the years following, Ida raised four children - Bruce, Eric, Richard and David - and worked beside her husband in the family business, which grew to include a dance pavilion, a post office, a store and a motel. In 1959 the family opened the Sea View Shopping Plaza.

Ida and George were always strong community supporters. They made space available for many community groups, and it was in McMorrans that the group which initiated construction of the Cordova Bay Community Hall held its early meetings. Ida and George supported the establishment of local basketball and baseball organizations, and Ida was a willing and cheerful assistant with the children when the Cordova Bay Elementary School first opened in 1946.

With Ida McMorran's death, we must regret the loss of a colourful and well-known pioneer figure in the life and development of our community.

SECOND PAGE COLUMN

View Protection: Not long ago, much concern was expressed over the height of a house being built on Cordova Bay Road, because it threatened the sea views from houses nearby. As a result, Saanich Council decided that where subdivision takes place in "view-sensitive" areas, the approving officer (in Saanich this is Alan Hopper, the municipal planner) should consider requiring single-storey zoning.

This is a thoughtful and productive decision. But it offers no protection where renovation or reconstruction is taking place, or where a house is being built on a vacant lot which is already zoned.

For full and adequate protection, the onus still lies squarely in the hands of residents. If you think that your view is going to be obstructed by a building, whether or not re-zoning is required first, get in touch with an alderman, or with the mayor and aldermen as a Council, and ask them to hear your concerns while there is still time.

The matter of view loss through tree growth is a thornier issue Among questions it raises still. are - do property owners have a legal right to a view? do owners have a legal right to do what they like (within limits) on their property? who pays for tree removal or topping should it be agreed to be done? The official attitude seems to be that there is no just route through the thicket of various individual rights. And where feelings are bound to run high, politicians wouldn't willingly touch the issue with the proverbial bargepole.

In 1983, a concerned resident approached the Rev. Andrew Gates on the matter of establishing suitable rental housing for elderly people in Cordova Bay. As a result of these early conversations, a public meeting was held and the Cordova Bay Seniors' Lodge Society came into being. A constitution for the organization, which is completely non-profit, was then drafted, and in 1984 the Society was incorporated.

The concerned resident contacted numerous churches that had already evolved similar plans for senior housing, and the Society's Board of Directors later visited a number of such projects to gain valuable first-hand information on how

to go about such an undertaking.

Between 1983 and 1988, much hard work has been done, and our housing complex on Sutcliffe Road is now nearing completion. For information about rental requirements and so forth, please contact Margaret Belford at 658-8920.

The building contains ten apartments: eight for single residents, one for a married couple and one for a handicapped or disabled person. There is a public lounge with a fireplace, a small service kitchen and a laundry room for the washer and dryer. Towards the back of the building is a parking area for residents.

Each apartment contains a bedroom, bathroom, kitchen and a large storage area; the living room has sliding glass doors opening onto a semi-private patio with garden planters for those with green thumbs. It is anticipated that the apartments will be ready for occupancy some time this June or July.

APRIL COMMUNITY SURVEY

In the March 31 issue of the Saanich News there is an article written by a C.R. Fields points out that while Saanich Council has opposed 60% of the requests for exclusion in the last two years, as being against the public interest, the Agricultural Land Commission has supported every request that has been made.

With the Agricultural Land Commission so obviously a broken reed, and in view of recent disquieting comments by Alan Hopper, Saanich Municipal Planner, about the continuing need for more developable land in Saanich and where it might be found, it seems time to worry a little more and a little harder about the small amount of agricultural land left in Saanich.
