THE PAT BAY HIGHWAY

Since the report in the October Cordovan, little direct action has taken place. However, that's not to say that nothing has been happening.

Shortly before the municipal election in mid-November, Saanich Council imposed a moratorium on the highway, pending adequate environmental and social studies. As a result, none of the scheduled Liaison Committee meetings have taken place.


A report from the Municipal Planner will go to Council before the end of January, "seeking direction" and asking permission for the Liaison Committee to meet.

The Ministry of Highways is all ready to go. The consultants - Reid Crowther of Vancouver - have been hired. The Ministry is asking for an early meeting of the Liaison Committee - a "stage-setting" meeting with the consultants. At that meeting, the consultants will outline the direction they will take, how they intend to conduct the study, the methods they will use, what information they will be seeking, and which sub-consultants with specialized backgrounds will be hired to do the various social and environmental studies.

When will the decisions be made that will affect Cordova Bay? According to the Ministry spokesman, perhaps a month or so after the upcoming meeting. Whenever that turns out to be!

There will be a full report in the late-March issue of The Cordovan. However, so as not to delay transmitting information to you, a report will be put up on the noticeboard at the shopping plaza whenever there is something to tell you. PLANNING REPORT

This month's topic is "gravel pits", a prominent part of life in Cordova Bay, involving, as it does, heavy truck traffic, environmental pollution and constant aggravation, particularly to those who live in the Bay area.

Yet this extremely visible operation is shrouded in mystery.

For example, although we have zoning by-laws to regulate the use of land, having due regard to "the promotion of health, safety, convenience and welfare of the public", they do not cover the extraction of sand and gravel. Why? Sand and gravel extraction is not considered to be a land use. Amazing, isn't it, that an operation that removes hundreds of thousands of tonnes of land and completely changes the appearance of the landscape is not considered a land use?!

Another mysterious approach to sand and gravel that comes to mind is related to the recent CRD sand and gravel report. To obtain the information for this report, the CRD sent a questionnaire to all the municipalities in the Capital Region. One of the questions asked if sand and gravel extraction in the municipality had caused any local conflicts due to truck traffic, noise, dust, safety, etc. Colwood admitted to problems. Saanich did not.

Could it be that the concerns we have shown for Cordova Bay are falling upon deaf ears?

THE FRIENDS OF MOUNT DOUGLAS PARK SOCIETY

During the fall, we made a major presentation to Saanich Council on alternate ways of providing local emergency services that would reduce the need for a large transmitter site at the summit of the park.

The presentation was a part of our response to a plan to remove land from the park before Saanich assumes full control of it. This plan would take out of the park the land surrounding the present transmitter site, a strip down the southern face for utilities, and all the roads through the park.

The plan has not been implemented, and all action has been stopped while Mayor Murray Coell talks to the Minister of Crown Lands.

The winter storms have brought down large numbers of mature trees, especially around the park boundaries, where they receive the full force of the wind and the ground is particularly wet. There is a possibility of a reforestation program being introduced, if the federal government will provide the funds. This is a move we strongly support.





ENVIRONMENT 1991

We all know about the planet's environmental problems - so overwhelming by now that we tend to forgive ourselves for not knowing quite where to start doing something about it.

But each individual action to reduce the toxins entering our air, water and soil does make a difference.

Since most of us spend 90% of our day indoors, we can start by removing as many household chemicals from our home as possible. Most of them come from the kitchen and the bathroom.

Over the past 50 years or so we have been bombarded with cleaning products which rely on synthetic chemicals, most of which have not been tested for short- or long-term effects on human beings. There are many safer, equally effective non-toxic alternatives to these toxic household products.

- * replace caustic cleaners (with ammonia and other disinfectants which cause eye, lung and skin irritations) with a mix of 1 or 2 teaspoons of borax (available in the supermarket), one quart of hot water, and a little distilled white vinegar. You can put it in a spray bottle and use it to clean walls, floors, countertops, stovetops, and even the oven. There is no release of toxic vapours (as there is with chlorine and ammonia-based cleaners) and it works better than the high-priced supermarket brands.
- in the bathroom, in place of mildew or mold cleaners which often include kerosene and formaldehyde, as well as other toxic chemicals that are absorbed through the skin, use a mixture of 4 to 8 tablespoons of borax to one quart equal parts water and vinegar. Spray and wipe clean. Borax is an excellent antibacterial agent, and it leaves no smell or fumes. Instead of germ killers which contain chlorine and formaldehyde, use a mix of borax and water (as for kitchen jobs). You'll get the same germ-free surfaces without toxic overload. instead of toilet cleaners with corrosive toxic irritants, use a toilet brush with baking soda and a mild, non-chlorinated detergent such as Bon Ami.
